## EDITORIAL NOTES

#### The "Ladies' Field'' Cup

Again we have pleasure in congratulating Miss D. A. Lintern on yet another victory in the competition for the above trophy. Seven times altogether has Miss Lintern won the Cup; her first success—in 1939—was under more strenuous conditions than have since been possible, for there were then ten players.

Since the war only eight competitors have taken part, and this year the number was reduced to six. Not for the first time in this competition—Miss Lintern had to play a deciding match (best of three) before her victory was complete. Mrs. E. Rotherham, who had won all her five games in the first series, lost two in the second; Miss Lintern, on the other hand, won all her games in the second series, and, in the play-off she won two games in sequence.

#### The Exhibition Matches at Wimbledon

No doubt Associates have not only seen the advertisement which appeared in the August *Gazette*, giving full particulars of these Matches which are to be held on the lawns of the All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club on Monday, September 7th, but they will support the Croquet Association by being present and bringing their friends.

This is a unique occasion. It is interesting to recall that before 1874 the All England Croquet Club flourished alone at Worple Road, Wimbledon; then lawn tennis soon became so popular that though the words Lawn Tennis were at first added to the title of the Club it was finally decided to eliminate the words "Croquet and" altogether. When, however, the Club removed to its present headquarters in Church Road, Wimbledon, it was a courtcous gesture to the older game to add "and Croquet" to its title.

The Exhibition matches will start at 1.30 p.m., and we are happy to state that the New Zealand player, Mr. A. G. F. Ross, will be among those playing. He is the present holder of the New Zealand Championship and creates a record by having won this honour for the 11th time.

Our own players will bc: E. P. C. Cotter, winner of the 1952 Men's Championship; H. O. Hicks, Open Champion 7 times; J. W. Solomon, holder of the Open Championship and Men's Championship 1953; Dr. W. R. D. Wiggins, joint holder of the Open, and the Mixed Doubles Championships, 1953. The women players are: Miss D. A. Lintern, Women's Championship winner, 1949 and 1951; Mrs. E. Rotherham, Women's Championship winner, 1952 and 1953; Mrs. G. J. Turketine, a former winner of the Peel Memorial Challenge Bowl.

It is interesting to state that two well known lawn tennis players (now also expert croquet players) will be taking part in these exhibition matches; they are: J. B. Gilbert, a former competitor in the Wimbledon Championship, and winner of the All England Plate; Capt. H. G. Stoker, R.N., also a frequent competitor at Wimbledon and a former Captain of the Royal Navy Lawn Tennis team.

#### **The Coronation Dinner**

It was a brilliant idea on the part of the Croquet Committee of the Roehampton Club to celebrate the year of the Coronation of our Patron, Her Majesty the Queen, by arranging for a Dinner to be held at the Club on Tuesday, August 18th. The occasion was a great success, and about 70 Associates and their friends spent a most enjoyable evening.

Mr. W. Longman, a Vice-President of the Croquet Association, was in the chair, and, after proposing the toast of Her Majesty, he spoke on the game's present position, reviewed its past, and made suggestions for its future. Among the latter, he thought smaller courts would attract more players to the game and larger hoops—i.e. four inch instead of  $3\frac{3}{4}$  inch.

Col. C. C. Adams in a speech of welcome proposed the health of the visitors; he made it the opportunity tactfully to suggest that those in the company who were not croquet players should certainly give the game a trial.

Mr. E. P. Duffield, replying to this toast, in a few words expressed his appreciation of the enterprise shown by the Croquet Committee in having so ably arranged the evening's entertainment. His keen interest in any scheme which would ensure the future of the game was abundantly clear in the conclusion of his speech.

Dr. N. H. Oliver provided an interlude by reciting his well known and clever parody of Kipling's "If." Mrs. Nickisson concluded the list of toasts by proposing the health of the Chairman, to which Mr. Longman suitably replied.

Roehampton Club is to be commended for the excellent dinner provided, and the staff who served it deserve to be duly praised.

## THE "LADIES' FIELD" CUP

#### THE HURLINGHAM CLUB

#### July 7th, 1953

Never have we known the weather to be so unkind to this old-established Competition.

In consequence of the number of best available Women Players having to be reduced to six—though nine had been invited with Miss M. J. Daldy as reserve—it was only necessary to play two games a day.

Mrs. E. Rotherham, Miss D. A. Lintern and Mrs. L. H. Ashton, showed their quality early in the competition indeed Mrs. Rotherham won all five games in the first series. Miss Lintern, after a good start, lost to Mrs. Ashton—and then to Mrs. Rotherham; in the second series, however, she won every one of her five games, and, as we shall see, qualified to play Mrs. Rotherham in the play-off. Mrs. Ashton, who had played well, lost only two games in each of the two series of five games each. Against Mrs. Rotherham in the fifth round, the close score of —1 suggests how narrow was her opponent's victory; and, in the fourth round, the score by which she lost to Mrs. B. H. Wiggins —5, shows that this too was a hardfought game.

Mrs. Wiggins, who won 4 games, had no casy successes against Mrs. E. Reeve (in both series), Mrs. Ashton, and Mrs. Apps—this last game was the only one with a score of double figures.

Mrs. Apps, who had a long run of defeats, very considerably redeemed her first series misfortunes by winning three games in the second; of these, her convincing win +21, against Mrs. Rotherham in the very last round was one of those instances of ill luck that has occurred before in this kind of Competition.

A player, who has no chance of winning, deprives (quite fairly and, indeed, laudably) another who appears to have complete victory awaiting her. So it was for Mrs. Rotherham.

Mrs. Reeve was not able to produce the quality of play which won her this Competition in 1928, 1929, 1931 and 1948.

#### THE PLAY-OFF

Mrs. Rotherham and Miss Lintern having tied, with 8 games each, this deciding match (best of three) was greatly looked forward to. It was played on the Tuesday of the following week.

As a result of Miss Lintern hitting her tice—which Mrs. Rotherham had missed—she made three hoops. Then she was permitted to start a break which she played with such accuracy that it soon looked certain to be concluded with a clip on 4-back. Mrs. Rotherham shot in, but missed a short roquet. Miss Lintern was again making good progress—but was stopped by the opposition of 1-back.

Soon after she shot in and made 4-back and the penultimate; then she picked up a good break from 1-back to the peg—though the single peel through the rover was not accomplished. Both balls, not long after, hit the peg and the first game went to Miss Lintern +23.

The second, and, as it proved, the deciding game, provided a slightly more even game. Nevertheless, Mrs. Rotherham was not able to produce the form which earlier won her seven games in succession. As the score, +17, by which she lost this second game, shows, the few points she made were not anything like Mrs. Rotherham at her best.

So Miss Lintern adds yet another to her six previous wins, five of the last being now consecutive.

Mrs. Ernest Turner was again in charge of the Competition and gave to every player the benefit of her courtesy and efficiency.

## AN OPEN LETTER TO MR. J. P. W. MALLALIEU, M.P.

#### Dear Mr. Mallalieu.

Some members of the Rochampton Club have drawn my attention to an article on Croquet recently written by you for the *Evening Standard*. They all strongly resented the tone of that article, and I confess that, on reading it, I shared their resentment.

In order that you might see the game played by experts and to record your impressions, you were I believe the guest of the Rochampton Club, and I understand that Mr. Crowther-Smith spent a considerable time in explaining the intricacies of the game and supplying you with any information you required. The result of all this was-to put it mildly—very disappointing, and when I had finished reading your article I could not help thinking of some lines of Pope with which you are doubtless familiar:—

"Damn with faint praise . . .

And without sneering teach the rest to sneer."

You were of course free to write what you wished and to express your opinion of what you saw, but I would like to ask you: Was it in the best possible taste to refer to one of our leading players as getting red and redder because his opponent was playing so well? It was not true.

Was it in the best taste to speak of the viciousness of the players? This was not true.

Was it in the best possible taste to speak of the game as being in the nature of a burial service? Was this true?

You refer to the spectators as being all elderly or middleaged. I would remind you, however, that croquet is essentially a game for the elderly and middle-aged. You acknowledge that the game requires skill and intelligence but some of us who are elderly or middle-aged possess both skill and intelligence. We have also many young players, as witness the fact that the winner of this year's Championship is twenty-one.

May I suggest (charitably) that you wrote your article in a fit of spleen or after a "hangover," and that it is possible that on reading your article in print you were rather ashamed of it.

If this is so it is a point in your favour; and it would be a further point in your favour if you were to express regret for what you have written.

## HURLINGHAM

#### AUGUST 3rd-12th

The Hurlingham Croquet Tournament has for many years been one of the most popular tournaments of the season and the reason is not far to seek. There could be no more delightful setting than the beautiful grounds of the Hurlingham Club, whilst the competitors enjoy all the amenities of the club itself. It is also an occasion for meeting old friends.

It was therefore a little disappointing that the entry this year should have been so small. Two reasons have been suggested as the cause of this. One reason was the Coronation festivities, which had left some of us with very little moncy to spend; and the other was that after the travesty of our summer the weather was not be trusted.

It is interesting to recall that it is just thirty-nine years since the August Bank Holiday fell on Monday, August 3rd, as this year, and the writer has a vivid recollection of that particular tournament. For the first two days interest in the game was overshadowed by fears and talk of impending tragedy, and on the Wednesday—after war had been officially declared—many players at once de-parted in order to take up important national duties. Serious croquet was impossible, and before the end of the week we had "broke the good meeting with most admired disorder," little thinking that it would be more than four years before we should be playing there again.

In spite of the smallness of the entry the tournament this year was a complete success. Many of our leading players took part and some very interesting games were witnessed.

In the first place we offer our hearty congratulations to Dr. Wiggins in winning the Hurlingham Cup for the first time. He beat Mr. Cotter in the Final by two straight games—a remarkable feat. With Mrs. Rotherham as his partner he also won the Open Doubles, and followed up his successes by reaching the final of the Handicap Singles.

A stroke of luck gave a spectacular finish to the final of the Doubles. When Dr. Wiggins was for four-back his partner Mrs. Rotherham was pegged out by Cotter whose partner, Miss Lintern, was then for the third hoop. Some time later when Miss Lintern had reached the rover hoop she left her two balls near the south boundary in prepara-tion for finishing in her next turn. Meanwhile Dr. Wiggins had reached the penultimate. With his ball now on the north boundary, he took his stance to shoot at one or other of the opponents' balls, 35 yards away. It was necessary for him to hit one of these balls in order to save the game. He took aim, but much to his surprise his the game. He took aim, but much to his surprise his ball ran straight through the penultimate, coming to rest within two yards of his opponents' balls. The rest was easy. He made the rover hoop off one of these balls, thus snatching victory when all seemed lost.

Another rather spectacular ending occurred in the first of the games between Cotter and Longman. Cotter had pegged out one of his balls but failed to peg out the second. When Longman had one of his balls for the peg and one for the rover hoop he placed them in an easy position for the finish having first put Cotter's ball out of harm's way in the second. in the second corner. Cotter took his last shot—the proverbial last shot—and hit the peg, another example of victory gained after everything had seemed lost.

The Turner Cup was won by Spencer Ell who beat Victor Evans in the Final. Mr. Shelley—a very promising player—was the winner of the Longworth Cup, and Mr. Hitchcock won the Younger Cup.

Mrs. Wiggins and Miss Carlyon won the Candlesticks defeating Mrs. Beaton and Mrs. Thom in the Final, having conceded four bisques. The latter part of this game was not without its thrills for the spectators. Mrs. Beaton and her partner were both for the peg when Mrs. Wiggins was for four-back and her partner only for the fifth hoop, the bisques having all gone. After some in and out plan the bisques having all gone. After some in and out play, lasting nearly three-quarters of an hour, Mrs. Wiggins and Miss Carlyon hoop by hoop fought their way round to succeed eventually in gaining a remarkable victory

Dr. Beavan won not only the Handicap Singles but the Extra Event also. He played consistently well throughout the meeting and now is probably waiting to hear what the Official Handicapper has to say about it.

Mr. Brackenbury was again our able Manager, and performed the almost impossible task of pleasing everyone.

A word of praise—or rather many words of praise—must be awarded to Col. Hayward, the popular games' manager of the Club. His interest in the game together with his valuable assistance at all times contributed very materially to the success of the meeting.

The weather which started kindly gave us later a few days of gloom, but recovered before the end of the week and the tournament was concluded in brilliant sunshine.

We can now only express the hope that when we meet again next year we shall have a pre-war entry, with all our old friends and many new ones, taking part. May we also express the hope that Mr. Brackenbury will again be the Manager of the Tournament and that Col. Hayward will give it his blessing.
